A reading from the prophet Isaiah

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Now John had heard in prison what the Messiah was doing and he sent his disciples to ask Jesus,

'Are you the one who is to come, or are we to expect someone else?'

Jesus answered,

'Go back and tell John what you hear and see; the blind see again, and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, the dead are raised to life and the good news is proclaimed to the poor; and blessed is anyone who does not find me a cause of stumbling.'
