What do people gain by all their work?

A reading from the book of Ecclesiastes

Vanity of vanities, says Qoheleth, vanity of vanities. All is vanity!

For here is one who has laboured wisely, skilfully and successfully, and must leave all to someone who has not toiled for it at all. Second Reading *‡* Colossians 3:1-5.9-11

Seek the things that are above where Christ is.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Colossians

Since you have been raised up to be with Christ, you must look for the things that are above, where Christ is, sitting at God's right hand. Let your thoughts be on things above, not on the things that are on earth, because you have died, and the life you have is hidden with Christ in God. But when Christ is revealed – and he is your life – you also will be revealed with him in glory.

Put to death, then, everything in you that is earthly: sexual vice, impurity, passion, evil desires and greed, which is idolatry; and do not lie to one another. You have stripped off your old personality with its practices, and you have put on a new personality which is being renewed in true knowledge in accordance with the image of its Creator; where there is no Greek and Jew, no circumcised and uncircumcised, no barbarian and Scythian, slave and free, but Christ is all and in all.
