A reading from the letter of St Paul to Philemon

This is Paul writing, an old man, and now also a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for my child, whose father I have become during this imprisonment, namely Onesimus.

I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. I should have liked to keep him with me; he could have served me on your behalf in this imprisonment for the gospel, but I want to do nothing without your consent, so that your good deed may not be forced on you but may be voluntary. For perhaps he was separated from you for a time for this very reason, that he might be with you for ever, no longer as a slave but as more than a slave, a dear brother, especially dear to me, but how much more to you, both on the natural plane and in the Lord! So, if you consider me a partner, welcome him as you would me.

Gospel *‡* Luke 14:25-33

All who do not renounce their possessions cannot be my disciples.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Great crowds accompanied Jesus on his way and he turned and spoke to them.

'Anyone who comes to me without hating father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, yes and even life itself, cannot be my disciple. No one who fails to carry the cross and come after me can be my disciple.

And indeed, which of you here, intending to build a tower, would not first sit down and work out the cost to see if you had enough to complete it? Otherwise, if you laid the foundation and then found yourself unable to finish the work, anyone who saw it would start making fun of you and saying, "Here is someone who started to build and was unable to finish."

Or again, what king marching to war against another king would not first sit down and consider whether with ten thousand men he could stand up to the other who was advancing against him with twenty thousand? If not, then while the other king was still a long way off, he would send envoys to negotiate peace.

So in the same way, none of you can be my disciple without giving up all that you own. The Gospel of the Lord.

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
