First Reading ‡ Amos 8:4-7 The Lord God spoke against those who buy the poor for money.

A reading from the prophet Amos

Listen to this, you who crush the needy and reduce the oppressed to nothing, you who say, 'When will New Moon be over so that we can sell our corn, and Sabbath, so that we can market our wheat?

Then we can make the bushel-measure smaller and the shekel-weight bigger, fraudulently tampering with the scales.

We can buy up the weak for silver and the poor for a pair of sandals and even get a price for the sweepings of the wheat.' The Lord has sworn by the pride of Jacob, 'Never will I forget anything that they have done.'

Second Reading ‡ 1 Timothy 2:1-8

Let prayers be offered to God for everyone; he wants all people to be saved.

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to Timothy

I urge then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercessions and thanksgiving should be offered for everyone, for kings and others in authority, so that we may be able to live peaceful and quiet lives with all devotion and dignity. This is right and acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour, who wants everyone to be saved and to reach full knowledge of the truth. For there is one God, and there is one mediator between God and human beings, himself human, Christ Jesus, who offered himself as a ransom for all – a testimony given in due time. Of this I was appointed herald and apostle and – I am telling the truth and no lie – a teacher of the gentiles in faith and truth.

In every place, then, I want the men to lift their hands up reverently in prayer, without anger or argument.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Jesus also said to his disciples,

'There was a rich man, and he had a manager who was denounced to him for squandering his property. He called for the man and said,

"What is this I hear about you? Draw me up an account of your management because you are not to be my manager any longer."

Then the manager said to himself,

"Now that my master is taking my position away from me, what am I to do? I am not strong enough to dig. I would be ashamed to go begging. I know what I will do to make sure that when I am dismissed from office people will welcome me into their homes."

'Then he called his master's debtors one by one.

To the first he said, "How much do you owe my master?"

"One hundred jars of oil," he said.

The manager said, "Take your bond; sit down and quickly write fifty."

To another he said, "And you, sir, how much do you owe?"

"One hundred sacks of wheat," he said.

The manager said, "Take your bond and write eighty."
